Dear Senators Landrieu, Coats and Members of the Subcommittee,

I write on behalf of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America - the nation's largest Orthodox Jewish umbrella organization - representing nearly 1,000 synagogues as well as hundreds of other community institutions.

The Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) is a program of critical importance to our community and we are proud to have worked with the Congress to create it. We have grave concerns that the Dept. of Homeland Security's Nonprofit Security Grant Program is susceptible to "discretionary" decisions that will zero-out funding in FY2013. For the sake of our community's safety, NSGP needs the subcommittee's strong and specific support within its draft FY2013 bill.

Only 5 of 12 homeland security programs were funded in FY2012. Given how Congress restructured funding for DHS grant programs last year, our ability to secure any funding for NSGP in FY2012 was a challenge.

Because Jewish communal institutions are among the highest threat of terrorist attack, please continue the Nonprofit Security Grant Program in your draft bill as a specific stand alone initiative and to fund it in FY2012 at no less than \$19 million (the FY2011 level).
